

The quality of the aircraft in competition is outstanding and we haven't even looked at the cars and boats. We'll take a look at some of those also if there's room. After filling up a memory stick with pictures, I made the obligatory trip through the booths with my shopping list. I picked up some bearings I needed, plenty of batteries from Batteries America, Fuel from Wildcat, jawed with the fella at Byron Fuels, picked up some spinners at Tru-Turn & an exhaust pipe for a muffler from B&B.

Now, a Toledo Trip is not complete without wandering through the swap shop area. Too much temptation. I finally found another Hanger 9 Edge 540 (78" ws) that's mostly ready to fly. I've since swapped out the MDS that came with it and dropped an OS 1.60FX in it's place. Also picked up a shoulder wing sport ship (84"ws) for a buddy and it's in great condi-As soon as he "gets his wings", he'll have this one in the air since he's already outfitted it with a new 120 4-stroke and Futaba gear. It should be a nice flier.



I had a chance to talk with Peter Goldsmith and Mike McConville at Horizon Hobbies and confirmed that I need to swap out a Spektrum AR500 receiver from one of my good planes and replace it with a receiver that's designed for larger models. The plane flew well but I have been "flirting with disaster" and figured I need to avoid the inevitable with what's considered a park flier receiver. It always pays to talk with the experts.



As a last walk through, there were several boats that must be mentioned. A great looking Thunderbolt Hydroplane by Dan Kramer of Delphos, Ohio with an incredible finish. There's also a beautiful Mahogany Runabout by Pio Santilli from Windsor, Ontario that's a real crowd stopper. There's so much more but so little space...oops, no more space. Be there next year.

Spring Field Opening



Field work always goes easier when you have the proper tools or....know somebody who has the proper tools. Peter V's brother brought his ditch witch and the trenching job was afoot. We needed to set up drainage for the area directly in front of the enclosure which has been holding water and the resultant mud. Once the trench was dug and proper drainage angle established,



the job of laying piping could commence. Perforated pipe was laid until we got beyond the enclosure area and then non-perforated piping could be used. Keith wrestled the unwieldy piping into place, praying that he wouldn't loose control to this constrictor and be dragged down into the trenching itself. Piping in place, and drainage confirmed, pea gravel was back filled around the piping and then covered with soil and leveled.

Trench work completed, attention was turned other jobs at hand. The Winter enclosure walls were removed and stored while and a couple fellas were up on the roof sealing up some holes.







The work crew moved on to the sidewalk leveling that was already in progress. Each of the patio blocks was removed, the ground leveled and the blocks set back into place.

All said and done, it was a great day of work with a lot accomplished. Let's Fly!


